

The Whitakers in **CAMBODIA**



The word “dorm” in the USA refers to student housing, but in Cambodia, there is no student housing. Young adults coming to the city to study or find work are vulnerable without a safe place to live.

Like other ministries, the Anglican Church rents larger houses in the city to create dorms of 15-20 residents for university students. The students pay a small fee for a safe place where they are protected from being trafficked, offered a better launching pad for their next season of life, and given daily opportunities to study the Bible and pray together. Dorms also allow us to identify and train leaders, and the dorms and churches feed into one another, sharing strength and growth.

Many dorm residents have come to faith over the years, and this month, two dorm residents, having recently graduated from Bible College, will now leave their dorm to begin overseeing another dorm. Additionally, another dorm graduate has also recently graduated from a Bible College and has joined the church staff to serve full-time.

I love that, really love that.

Pictured is Pastor Chan who is the dorm leader at one of our locations in Phnom Penh that has twenty+ residents. He also co-pastors one of our Khmer-speaking congregations in the city, and I'll tell you about it next month.
